

One flat side completed the job, with a small circular opening for mum.

A black bird some eighteen centimetres long, interrupted our reverie from its perch on a reed nearby. It did not have much to say. But it rippled its wings with gay abandon, revealing flashes of white under its wings. We scrambled through our copy of Newman's Birds of South Africa and discovered we had just met a gentleman Thick-Billed Weaver.

A lady Thick-Billed Weaver soon appeared on the scene and watched coyly from a reed nearby. The gentleman's antics went into overdrive, but she was playing hard to get. Finally, the lady examined every detail of the nest, before flying off with disdain. The gentleman immediately set to work, making detailed adjustments. I have no idea how he knew what the lady wanted. You don't suppose she WhatsApped him, do you?

The lady returned later and re-inspected the nest. She rippled her wings in approval and the two flew off, dancing through the air. The next morning the lady was snoozing in the nest, although the gentleman had to nod off in a tree.

A sign at the loo on the way to the resort restaurant reads: *Gentlemen to the left, Ladies to the right, because Ladies are always right!* Just like it was with our Thick-Billed Weavers on that sunny day.

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FACT, FICTION & FOIBLES by Sharon Gluckman

THE WITCHES OF SALEM

This is a tale of mass hysteria, ignorance, blame and fear.

It was the spring of 1692, in the village of Salem in Massachusetts, America. A clergyman Samuel Parris observed both his niece, Abigail Williams and his own daughter, Betty Parris, exhibiting strange behaviours. This included double vision, contortions, rigidity, violent fits, tremors and odd behaviour. The local doctor, William Griggs was called in but could find no physical cause. Eventually he diagnosed "bewitchment". This was a poor puritan village and accusations began to spread like wildfire. Neighbours suspected neighbours, friends turned on friends... the "bewitched" began to grow in numbers.



Children would fall down screaming, crying and behaving in manners most strange. Fingers were pointed here, there and everywhere.

The first three "witches" arrested were Sarah Good, a homeless beggar, Sarah Osborne, a poor elderly lady and Tituba, a Carribean slave who belonged to Rev. Parris. A special court was set up. Soon over 150 men, women and children were imprisoned and awaiting trial. In June the first convicted witch was hanged at Gallows Hill in Salem. Another 18 would see the same fate. Giles Corey was pressed to death by stones for refusing to admit guilt. Others were also tortured. One method was to tie up the accused and dunk them in a body of water. If they sank they were innocent, but if they floated this indicated guilt. Several died in prison like Sarah Good. Her 4-year-old daughter, Dorothy, was even imprisoned as a possible witch. 2 dogs were hung as witches' familiars. By September 1693 the situation began to normalise and the hysteria died down. The surviving prisoners were released and families pardoned.

BUT, WHAT CAUSED THIS EVENT?

Several possible reasons were considered: an earlier smallpox epidemic; the fear of attack by neighbouring hostile Native American Indians; suspicion and jealousy amongst families; the puritan beliefs; church politics and possibly an outbreak of encephalitis may have all contributed to this madness.

AND THEN, finally, an answer that appears very relevant!

Its been postulated that the "bewitched" victims could well have been suffering from fungus poisoning. Ergot fungus found in rye crops and other grains can produce LSD-like hallucinatory effects. This would explain all the peculiar reactions and behaviours. Rye was a staple crop at the time and studies have found that there were several very wet seasons. Rye kept in storage in damp conditions over long periods could well have caused fungal infestations.

In a nutshell, they **were** probably flying. Because, in fact, they were as high as kites! A study by toxicologists, published in Science magazine in 1976, cited the fungus ergot as a cause of symptoms such as delusions, muscle spasms and odd behaviour. All the supposed pacts with the devil came to nought.

Over 2 centuries later (1950-1954) in America, another series of witch hunts surfaced. They mirrored the Salem witch hunts of 1692 and once again they brought with them untold misery, fear and mass hysteria. They were engineered by Senator Joseph McCarthy when communism was considered a real threat to the country. The *First Red Scare* took place in Russia with the overthrow of the Czar in 1917.

The *Second Red Scare* was the first of 2 witch hunts that began in 1950. It was accompanied by *The Lavender Scare* which targeted homosexuals, who, at the time, were considered mentally ill and sexual

deviants. Both were considered serious threats to democracy and the wellbeing of the nation.

Committees, along with the FBI, were appointed to hunt down and blacklist suspected communists, leftists and free thinkers like authors, composers, actors and scientists. Homosexuals were followed, harassed, outed and jailed. Many had their lives shattered.

Globally, there are constant witch hunts. Governments and those in power use them to eliminate threats. There have always been the vulnerable, the fall guys, forced to take the 'heat' when society is in turmoil. Mostly these hunts are illogical and misdirected at those on the fringes of society. It is a most useful but toxic means of control, keeping a lid on turmoil and silencing controversy in a world gone awry!

PEGGY – A STORY WITH A HAPPY ENDING told by Rob Bothma



Welcome home Peggy!

A few months ago, one of the regular storks that visited MRV gardens appeared with a severely damaged leg, which seemed to have been broken below the knee joint. (See image above.)

Attempts were made to capture her for the SPCA / Animal Rehabilitation Centre to see if they could assist her, but these were not successful.

Sadly, she just disappeared but then, after an absence of about 2 months, Peggy returned and seems to be fully recovered after having half her leg amputated. (See image alongside.)

Note:

Due to her smaller size with the other stork that she always appeared with, we assumed she was a female.

• She was named Peggy due to her peg-leg.





BIRD TALK with Peter B. Munday

Report No. 26 (November/December)

Penny Paterson (MRV209) reports having had a visit by an inquisitive **Speckled Mousebird**, and a **Yellow-rumped Tinkerbird** (formerly the Golden Rumped Tinker Barbet).

Charmaine Klintworth (MRV267) has had a pair of **Paradise Flycatchers** grace her garden! Also seen a Juvenile **African Harrier-Hawk** (Gymnogene) being pursued by a few small birds.

The story behind the wounded **Woolly-necked Stork** was resolved and my worries over the poor bird have been relieved. I am very happy to close the subject now that "Peggy" has reappeared and is coping with her disability. My innovative mind does wonder if we could fit a prosthesis made from a carbon fibre golf club shaft, which would help in her walking but not when she was alighting in a tree. No, I'll let nature take its curative course. Hallelujah! Whilst on the subject of the Woolly-necked Stork, several months ago an alert was received to report the ring **number** on tagged or ringed Storks, together with date and location. Sadly, no reports have been forwarded and I certainly have not seen any ringed Storks.

Our family and an overseas visitor went to the Umkobi lagoon one cloudy late November evening to see the "KZN Summer Biological Phenomenon". The migrant Barn Swallows (formerly called the European Barn Swallow) massing to roost in the reed beds. The Barn Swallow breeds in the Northern Hemisphere, Russia, Western, Central and Eastern Europe (20 to 70 degrees North). They generally arrive in South Africa in early November and return north in March-April. <u>Click here to see the video</u>...and there are no prizes for guessing how many swallows there are in the flock!!



TOPICAL TIPS! ☆ Cordless phones ⇔ by Chris King (MRV169)

Hello everyone, thanks to our intrepid editor Joy, Topical Tips is back! So here is my first article of 2025 - I hope that you find something of interest here;

Most of us village residents (MRV and RRV) have a village phone, and are they ever handy! You can phone your neighbour, friend, maintenance and admin at no cost. But its a bit of a problem when the basic phone is in your bedroom and you are in the kitchen or outside gardening. Enter the cordless phone.

A cordless phone is a portable phone that lets you answer and make calls on the village line anywhere in your cottage and often in your garden. Many of us have these phones, and they are great, they really simplify your life. But what happens when your cordless phone dies halfway through the day - the batteries just don't hold up?

So here is the issue - cordless phones use 1,2 volt AAA *rechargeable* batteries, and these are different from normal AAA batteries. The standard AAA batteries that you buy over the counter are alkaline 1,5 volt batteries and these are NOT rechargeable. If you buy standard 1,5 volt AAA batteries and fit them into your cordless phone two things will probably happen:



- 1. The phone will work for a short while but run down after a few days.
 2. These batteries aren't designed to be recharged so they will start to leak acid leaks out of the batteries and will damage your phone, very often irreparably.
- So if you have a cordless phone which doesn't last the day be very careful when you replace the batteries. Fit only 1,2 volt rechargeables if you fit the wrong type you might well have to bin your phone. If changing the batteries doesn't solve the problem you might have a fault with the charging station. Please note that during power outages, portable rechargeable phones cannot work.


Time would be better spent in pursuit of knowledge and creative thought patterns.
