I look forward to seeing you soon! Friedel





Report No. 29 (Feb/Mar 25)

Mel Glover reported seeing a beautiful African Harrier Hawk sitting on the Boma roof adjacent to the swimming pool.

Carrie Johnson not only saw but got a good snap of a group of seedeaters feeding on the lawn in front of MRV37. In the group were Village Weavers and Red Bishops and, most surprisingly, a very pretty little Rosyfaced Lovebird (Roberts No. 367). The latter has not been reported as seen in MRV before. Thus, it is a "FIRST TIME" in all classes! The gorgeously coloured Rosyfaced Lovebird is an escapee from captivity as they are common in small flocks through Angola south to the extreme northwestern Cape. They are a sought-after and traded aviary attraction.

Dave Fardell (MRV176) has heard the **Spur Fowl** (Natal Francolin) calling. Gordon Aylward (MRV231) has seen the Spur Fowl in the garden. Margaret Jones (MRV146) thinks the Fowl is nesting in the thick undergrowth in front of her cottage. Penny Hugo (MRV178) has heard the Spur Fowl and also the **Diedericks Cuckoo** calling.


Dave & Jenny Fardell (MRV176) saw a stationary bird perched in a tree in

They married on 7 April 1961. That was 64 years ago. Val was a lab technician in biochemistry and Bobby was working on the Blue Streak Rocket Project with RPE Westcott. When America got ahead in the space race and the British rocket project was shelved, the couple decided to spread their wings and moved to South Africa who were actively recruiting skilled people. Bobby got a job with Atlas Aircraft in Jet Park where he won numerous awards for outstanding achievement. Val busied herself raising their two boys, Charles and David, and later worked for SKF Engineering as a production manager. She ultimately ran a small stainless-steel foundry, supplying the mines.

The time came for them to retire (properly) and they moved to Uvongo in 2003. Inspired by Ernie Els, they took


to playing golf with Val becoming the Ladies Golf Captain of Margate Country Club. They also became active members of the Margate Methodist Church.

THE WAFFLE HOUSE & NEMVELO FARM PRESENTATION

The Waffle House and Nemvelo Farm hosted a most informative talk on Thursday 14 March, in the Ronnie Baker Hall. Our Vibe editor, Joy Crutchfield, introduced Clinten Peters (Manager: The Waffle House and Nemvelo Farm) and Jessica Reed (Co-ordinator: Marketing). Clinten had all of us like-minded 'wannabee farmers' engrossed with such an interesting talk and slide show on the Nemvelo Farm and its workings, as well as The Waffle House, one of South Coast's most iconic and popular restaurants.

Nemvelo Farm was established over 7 years ago as a partner to the Waffle House. Its mission is to supply The Waffle House with the consistently high quality of organic vegetables and free-range chickens that the restaurant's world-class standards demand. The farm covers 6,5 hectares of which 2,5 hectares is devoted entirely to organic vegetable gardening. It's run by 6 staff members with the help of interns from various colleges and techs, thus giving the students invaluable practical training.

All chickens are free-range, they are allowed to run free, and the farm has its own licensed abattoir to ensure proper farm-to-table quality control. Only 'homemade' insecticides are applied to crops using such ingredients as red peppers, garlic, oil, ash and milk. EMO (Effective Microorganisms) which

includes live enzymes to help build up the soil and worm tea, is also used. This results in the luscious green veg we saw in the slide show and also encourages faster crop growth. It's all a matter of GROW RIGHT...EAT RIGHT!

The Waffle House is open 7 days a week and has wheelchair access. They also allow dogs on leashes. The Deli is supplied by Nemvelo farm and has tantalising and unusual products such as carrot jam, which is, as we are told by Clinten, delicious! Training and development are prioritised in both facilities as is evidenced by the warm and professional staff. All excess produce is donated to the Hope Houses to feed the underprivileged.

After this most enlightening talk, residents were treated to a scrumptious tea with muffins and cookies supplied by the Waffle House.

A big thank you to everyone who joined in to make the day special.

A NEW INITIATIVE

Nemvelo Farm now delivers produce surplus to their needs on a first-come-first-served basis, as well as prepared items from The Waffle House Deli, to the Villages. The 'Availability List' is sent via WhatsApp to their clients on Thursdays and deliveries will be made on Fridays at Cafe Munro (MRV) and at a venue to be advised at RRV.

To join the group, save 'Nemvelo Farm Availability List 071 303 6655' to your cell phone contacts and send Clinten a WhatsApp with your Name and Cottage Number and make sure to save his number. You will then receive the weekly Availability List; your order will be delivered to you together with the Invoice; and you can pay via EFT on receipt.

In addition, The Waffle House offers a Pensioners 60+ card which entitles the holder to receive a 15% discount on a meal every day of the week! Cards are available from the Waffle House and are only for use at the restaurant by the card holder. The card does not apply to Deli purchases or Farm orders.



RESCOM NEWS by Olliver Ransome

The RRV pool: The decision has been made to install a pool. The size, placement and the source of the cost of installation will be management decisions.

The Budget: We were disappointed about the proposed 9% hike but were persuaded that previous budget adjustments had not adequately covered the steep rises in costs of essentials like power, food and fuel. The 9% was necessary to prevent the HRV trading at even larger operational deficits.

We asked why the rental of MRV garages had to be at 9% as well and the answer was the MRV was the only Village where garages were not attached to cottages and the levies on the others were higher.

Solar Power: Agreement has been reached in principle concerning compensation for power being fed back into our village grids – the rate to depend on Eskom's new tariffs. It has also been agreed that the fixed Eskom costs must be shared between all users, on a sliding scale dependant on usage. Up to now, this cost has been incorporated into the per kWh rate.

The Wheelchair Accessible Vehicle: This vehicle, which had been substantially sponsored by the Comfort Fund, has had much more use than was initially anticipated. It can safely transport wheelchair-bound residents to the local hospitals, thus saving them high ambulance fees and is a great asset for our residents.

Assisted Living: The decision has been made to develop plans and get costs to reconfigure the rooms on the first floor Hibiscus Heights to allow most rooms to have *en-suite* bathrooms. There is a problem with plumbing but we are confident that solutions can be found.

Staff Transport: Many residents are distressed by the fact that staff members, particularly from Hibiscus Heights, have a long way to walk in all sorts of weather, to get a taxi below Pick n Pay. Chris King is looking at possible solutions, but, in the meantime, residents are urged to give these folk lifts when possible.


NEW GARDENING PRACTICES TO BE INTRODUCED IN OUR HRV VILLAGES

In line with the Organic & Herbivore Society of Southern Africa guidelines, Margate Retirement Village will be introducing tame sheep into the grassed areas around the village. It serves as a dual purpose in terms of reducing the need for constant grass cutting plus as a fertiliser/manure combo for the various lawns.

This is purely experimental and is a first for the KZN South Coast. The initiative has been welcomed by the Hibiscus Coast Municipality and local conservancies in the area. Please do not pat or feed these animals.

BERLIN – Great escapes

When World War 11 ended in 1945, it was decided at the Potsdam Conference, that the 4 Allied Powers: Britain, The United States of America, France and The Soviet Union would each be zoned an area of Germany's Berlin. The Cold War had begun. Initially the borders between East and West Berlin were fairly porous, but as the communist East became more restrictive and oppressive, people began to flock to the capitalist west. In 1952 the East Germans closed the borders and, in a surprise move on 13 August 1961, wire barriers were erected between all crossing points. Watchtowers were erected with armed guards. Overnight neighbourhoods and families were separated and a fortified concrete wall eventually encircled West Berlin. It was 155 km long and 4 metres high

creating a land-mined corridor between east and west.

Many tried to escape to the west over the years. One case in point was the Peter Strelzyk and Gunter Wetzel families. Desperate to escape, the 2 patriarchs decided to build a hot air balloon. Appliances and material were hard to come by. Fortunately, Peter was an electrician and mechanic by trade, and he and Gunter set about creating their escape 'machine'. They needed a large amount of synthetic material but everywhere there were government informers. So, as not to arouse suspicion, they began to buy material in 100sq meter sections from different shops around Berlin. They sewed it all together on a manual sewing machine with heavy duty thread. A propain tank attached to a stove-pipe served as a release



valve for hot air. The passenger basket was made of steel poles and nylon ropes. It needed to accommodate 4 adults and 4 children. Test runs had to be conducted deep in the forests. Their first 2 attempts failed and debris left behind caught the attention of the border guards and secret police, who promptly posted adverts asking for help to catch the culprits.

Peter and Gunter realised they had to move fast. On 16 September 1979 at 01h00, the 2 families crowded together in their makeshift basket, ready for lift off. The ropes holding the balloon could not be cut simultaneously, and the balloon leaned to one side tilting the gas burner, and a section of material caught alight. There was no time to waste, the searchlights and trigger-hungry soldiers were too close. They managed to put the fire out and the balloon rose unsteadily into the dark sky. They reached an altitude of 2,000 metres and 28 minutes later they crashlanded in a field in Bayaria some 18km away. They were free! In 1982 their epic journey resulted in a film 'Mit Dem Wind Das Nach Western'.

From 1961-1989 many desperate East Germans escaped to the West. Some using quite ingenious methods to do so...these included zipwires, homemade submarines, microlight planes, modified cars, hot air balloons and many other means. One train-driver even used his train with 15 passengers on board. With the locomotive on full power, he raced through the last stop in East Berlin. With bullets ricocheting around them, they reached safety 2km down the line in the West. Bernd Boettger crossed the sea to Sweden on his second attempt, using a micro-submarine with a 2-stroke bicycle engine and a rubber snorkel tube for air. His first attempt had ended in failure and a 3month stint in jail. Another used his Austin Healy Sprite convertible. He removed the windscreen, ducked down and slipped under the lowered barrier at a checkpoint with bullets whizzing over his head.

By 1989 civil unrest and political change in Europe eventually resulted in the fall of the Berlin Wall. And by 1990 there was little left of the barrier that had caused such controversy, heartache and division. Its estimated that over 5,000 actually escaped whilst the wall was up. However, many committed suicide, others were imprisoned, tortured and killed in attempts to flee communism and create a better future for themselves and their families.

I am sad to say my lavender bushes, although growing beautifully, are not flowering. My thoughts are they do not like all the rain as they do best in arid areas so, hopefully, they will still surprise me when things dry out a bit. I might get lucky.

The Waffle House & Nemvelo Farm gave such an interesting talk and it was so nice to hear how much work and dedication goes into growing organic produce. Good to know we can get organic veg, free from pesticides, on our doorstep. I am going to enjoy using my 60+ loyalty card.

Everyone wants a good deal - if you can save money when a good price is being offered why not jump at it? Here are a few special offers to be found on the lower South Coast:

- 1. **Spar:** We all know the local Spars Ramsgate, Manaba, Uvongo and Shelly Beach. Most Spars have a pensioner's day and they offer great discounts on fruit and veg, and even at Tops. Check which day of the week your Spar has their pensioners day.
- 2. **Spar Ramsgate:** There is a year-round special we enjoy every so often Sunday lunch for only R70. The two of us comfortably share one order so it turns out to cost R35 per person for Sunday lunch, and Ramsgate Spar will deliver to your door free of charge! You can order by phone and options are chicken, pork and beef, all with pudding. (Beef is a little more expensive). You can pay by card on delivery.
- 3. **Shoprite:** You will know that Shoprite and Checkers are both part of the Shoprite Group, and while most of us support Checkers, it is well worth checking out the prices at Shoprite in Marine Drive. My favourite is their 600-gram in-house brown bread at just R9,99 per loaf! It's good quality and if you want to reduce your calorie intake these loaves are a smaller profile. They also bake 600-gram wholewheat on selected days.
- 4. <u>Checkers X-Card</u>: Most of us have registered for a Checkers X-Card and it saves a lot on certain items. Please know that you can also use your X-Card at Shoprite.
- 5. <u>Pick n Pay:</u> Pick n Pay is on a recovery drive and the Margate store has a new manager and a smart new look. The staff are efficient and friendly and if you look around there are some very good specials we shop there quite often. If you pay with an FNB card you will gain extra eBucks on some items.

Love of my life...

I would guess that many readers don't want to see or read about woolly-necked storks for the rest of their lives but give me a chance. If you've seen a pair of them together, you must have noticed that they would appear to be very affectionate. They stand close together and are almost constantly grooming each other, particularly on those remarkable necks. But is this affection? Yes.

Many bird species mate for life, including many of the storks, one definite being the saddle-billed stork. So do ducks. Bird people usually refer to them as being in pairs. One in particular is the African black duck, which should be fairly common around here. In fact, most swans and geese too.

Moving away from them, some eagles mate for life, including the fish eagle and the osprey, although not a true eagle. And in that area, the barn owl is also a lifer. Moving away from birds, can mammals experience affection? The answer is another definite "yes". The best examples must be dogs and cats, and most of us have had experience with one or both of them. Take a dog, for example, note that it will leap up as you enter the room, tail wagging, tongue lolling. One hardly needs to describe a cat's affection for its human, it will curl up on your lap and purr for hours.

So, do some animals love for life? Personally, I think "love" is a human term, applying to humans, but many animal pairs most certainly show affection for life.

NATALINA CAFFRA - THE SNAIL THAT DEVOURS OTHER SNAILS by RRV 53 & 54

These incredible snails were recorded early in Natal's history, having been found feeding on battlefield corpses during the Zulu wars.



Imagine our surprise when we stumbled across this beauty on our driveway early one morning – "a snail which used to be common before the advent of gardeners' poisons; the carnivorous snail, Natalina caffra."

"A large *Natalina* will devour small snails at the rate of about one every hour. However, should it find a snail roughly its own size, the feast usually lasts for about two days. A few hours after a large kill, a Natalina may be seen wrapping its "tail" around the prey and dragging it off to a safer, out of the way, spot under dead leaves."

"A tiny *Natalina* can become very brave and attack snails much larger than itself. *Natalina* snails will also eat those hated, slimy, garden slugs (snails from the nudist colony!). To watch this is even more exciting, or gruesome, depending on your constitution. This is because you can see the entire process taking place as opposed to the case of snails where the Natalina puts its head inside the prey's shell. Smaller slugs are simply sucked up like spaghetti!"


