The quote "In England's Green and Pleasant Land" is a closing line in William Blake's 1804 poem, "And Did Those Feet in Ancient Time", also known as the poem, Jerusalem.

21<sup>st</sup> century poet Owain Glyn repeated this refrain in his Poem - This Green and Pleasant Land.....where he drew comparisons between parts of surburbia, and inner cities with their high rises, malls and grimy halls.

Did such thoughts pass through the mind of our intrepid Rescom Chairman John Cooke, as he soared over our Village, riding pillion behind our own John Woosey on his Microlight? The pictures show Umdoni Village nestling cosily among the trees, beautiful, and quiet, where the spirit echoes continuity with the neighbouring forest.

Adjoining us is Umdoni Point, and also the golf course, and in the distance one can see a different shade of green as the cane-fields reach out to Sezela Sugar Mill.

Such beautiful surroundings include predominant Water-berry Trees, also known as Umdoni, from whence we get our name. Credit must go to previous Umdoni resident and our first Conservation Officer, Gerald Teale, in 2002. As development progressed, he was involved in alien vegetation removal, eradicating among others, syringa trees, inkberry, bugweed, an old banana plantation and a stand of gum trees, whilst preserving the indigenous canopy.

Forward thinking work like that was based upon expert knowledge, and maintaining the status quo is surely our responsibility in managing the trees and forest as acknowledgement that we are privileged to live in the Village.

Back to the Microlight: John Woosey is our resident Microlight pilot, and keeps his craft at the little airfield near Craigieburn. If you see or hear him on a weekend morning, give him a wave!

#### Nature Notes by Claude Leroy

#### Nightlife in the Village.

I will exclude residents from this article for obvious (?) reasons!

We have Blue and Grey Duiker, Bushbuck, Banded Mongoose, Slender Mongoose, Dassies (Rock Hyrax) and of course the Vervet Monkeys that are seen during the day. The Grey Duiker and Bushbuck happily raid gardens at night and I have observed a horde of Banded Mongoose heading home after dark but the night belongs to the truly nocturnal creatures. We have two prevalent in our Village: South African Large-spotted Genet and Water Mongoose.





They roam our Village, silently, in the dead of night looking for a meal – rodents, crabs, insects, an occasional mole and whatever else that may be edible. None of the noises heard at night are made by these guys – the Wahlberg's Epaulette Fruit Bat is the one that produces the pings and weird sounds heard. We are indeed fortunate to live here with all this wildlife around us and it is incumbent on us to ensure that we protect the environment that supports them.

There was an article on BATS in the April edition – Two species had been identified as being present in our Village. Since then, we can add another species.

Receiving a call from Lana about a bat in one of the cottages being renovated, I found it was a new species of bat. It was identified as a Large-eared Giant Mastiff Bat. What's more it is listed as "Near Threatened"

globally. It is a member of the free tailed bats family – note it's long tail.

A budget has been allocated for the much needed and urgent **management of the environmental areas** of the village including the removal of alien vegetation and it is hoped this starts very soon.

As of now I believe the actual details of the **Eskom rises in fixed charges and tariffs** are still not known. If any resident has any concerns about their electricity meters or charges in their June levy statements please contact maintenance in the first instance.

Following a recent case, please be reminded of the importance of filling in the forms with all your medical information and fixing to the back of the bedroom door. If this information is not available to the first responders it can cause delays in essential treatment and action—this information can literally save your life.




The normal time for the return journey had passed but Adam refused to leave us until Justin came and he had seen us safely into the second car.



#### Wellness Day by Don Tandy

The second Health and Wellness day held in the hall proved to be very informative, with a selection of polished presenters keeping the audience interested, and stalls manned by medical professionals and medical services, including Leafline Incontinence Protection, Hibiscus Dietetics, Wound care, Nature Nuts, Honey, Reiki therapy, Diagnostic services, MRKhan Biokinetics and Scottburgh Hibiscus Hospital.

The day was ably organized by Janet Dalton who started the presentations with an outline of "Wellness" and what it includes, i.e., positive emotions and moods, absence of negative mental conditions and satisfaction with life, and how it manifests itself in physical, social, spiritual, intellectual and emotional spheres of life.

Next up was a presentation on 'Foot care for Health' by B Kheswa, which outlined various foot ailments like Tinea Pedis (athletes foot), Tinea Unguium (fungal infection of the nail), Candidosis (yeast infection which presents as a red itchy rash), outlining the symptoms, causes and treatments.

An important aspect of wellness is the need for staying active, and a fun and good way to achieve this is by joining in one or more of the village activities. To demonstrate this, our village line dancers entertained the gathering.



The importance of exercise for health was stressed by MR Khan from MRK Biokinetics, with gardening, walking, cycling, dancing, aerobics (water & chair), tennis, bowls and gym being examples of physical activities that are active in the village; with reading, lounging, playing board games, painting or meditating examples of passive activity.

Janet Dalton opened a conversation about anxiety, ending with a few pointers going forward to benefit your mental health.

The final session was a presentation by Dr Anele Yako (Ophthalmologist) on 'Preventable Blindness', understanding the causes, consequences and solutions to eye conditions like cataracts, refractive errors, glaucoma, diabetic retinopathy, trachoma and vitamin A deficiency. The graphic slides were of particular interest.



- Mandatory advanced driver testing for certain vehicles Speed limit adjustments on national and provincial roads Technology-based enforcement using AI cameras

Here's a breakdown of the five most important new rules that will come into effect starting July 2025:

These changes are legally binding and will be enforced with immediate effect from 1 July 2025.

#### **New Speed Limits in Urban and Rural Areas**

The speed limit regulations are being adjusted to reduce road fatalities in high-risk zones:

Area Type	Old Speed Limit	New Speed Limit (From July 2025)
Residential Streets	60 km/h	50 km/h
Urban Roads	80 km/h	70 km/h
School Zones	60 km/h	40 km/h
Rural Roads	100 km/h	90 km/h
Highways (Urban)	120 km/h	110 km/h
Highways (Rural)	120 km/h	Remains 120 km/h
Construction Zones	Varies	Strict 40 km/h enforced

Speeding fines and point penalties will automatically apply for violations above 5 km/h over the limit.
